





CAN MAKING A MOVIE CHANGE A LIFE

The Goal

The Bromont pilot program gives a voice to the marginalized and less fortunate, providing them with an opportunity to tell their own story, address social issues and at the same time develop a career inside the film industry. The Bromont program aims to reduce recidivism by providing housing, life skills, and job training. Our goal is to influence people's view on the disenfranchised of our communities, and inspire change, while at the same time empowering the participants to make long-term change.

Trainees

Forty trainees who show a strong interest and passion for the creative arts will be chosen for the pilot program. Year-long modules include production training, film career coaching, job industry placement and a wide range of creative and life skills workshops. After graduating, they will receive a one-month free membership to The Blacklist that provides a free evaluation of their scripts and the opportunity for their scripts to be seen by Hollywood producers.

One of the main features of the Bromont Program is the opportunity to work on a feature film from development to distribution. Trainees will work crew, business, and creative positions alongside industry professionals according to their skills, interests and training.

Fellows

Of the forty, six of the most promising candidates will receive a full Fellowship. These fellows will receive housing and intensive training in the fields of writing, acting, and directing. Additionally, they will work paid internships and attend one-on-one mentorship meetings with Hollywood insiders and celebrities. At the culmination of the rigorous, year-long fellowship, graduates will have the opportunity to pitch their work to industry insiders. One of their projects will be selected to be produced by the subsequent cohort of fellows.

Workshops Trainees take workshops that focus on different aspects of the film industry that include writing, acting, camera operating, etc. There will be one-day and three- to-fiveday intensive workshops available. A one-day master workshop, taught by celebrities and/or successful mentors in the film industry, will also be made available. All workshops and master classes will also be available to alumni and formerly incarcerated peers.

Writing classes Additional tutoring and writing assistance will be provided

Make a film Each trainee will have the opportunity to write and direct their own short film supported by their fellow trainees.

Life skills The Fellows will learn important skills that cover personal finance, budgeting, banking, and etiquette, for sustainable life changes beyond the duration of the program.

Bromont Fellowship

Work Training Program Fellowship recipients will be given an opportunity to work in the film industry through a paid internship (10-20 hours/week). Having a source of income allows the Fellows to focus on their training and provides a fellow the opportunity to save thirty percent of their salary as a means to transition out of the Bromont Fellowship.

School 📕 As required by the Bromont Fellowship, Fellows will be required to maintain part-time attendance at an approved

Hands-on 📕 By actively working in pre-production, production, and post-production, Fellows are given the opportunity to engage in a film project from beginning to end.

Permanent All the participants will receive help securing new housing after their training, when the Bromont Fellowship is over.

Future The Fellowship will help with job training and placement.
